Purpose of Revisions

- Following are the two main purposes:
 - To consolidate the statute law as of a particular date
 - Provides an official consolidation of the statute law as of that date
 - Generally to improve the readability of the statutes without changing the meaning

Authority for Revisions

- Authorized by statute
 - Recent statute revision Acts
 - Earlier statute revision Acts

Statute Revision Process

- Who is responsible for preparing a revision?
- Determining the scope of the revision
- Bringing a revision into force

Revision Powers

- Following are some of the main revision powers:
 - Consolidate in the revision all amendments made to an enactment
 - Change the numbering and the arrangement of enactments
 - Revise and alter language to achieve gender-neutral terminology
 - Revise and alter language so as to give better expression to the meaning of the law

Revision Powers – cont'd

- Following are some of the main revision powers – cont'd:
 - Make any alterations in language and punctuation that are desirable to obtain a uniform mode of expression
 - Change any outdated references
 - Correct clerical, grammatical or typographical errors
 - Repeal enactments that are obsolete, are spent or have no legal effect

Legal Effect of a Statute Revision

- Meant to have no significant legal effect
- Presumption against change in the law
- What if there is an inadvertent change in the law?
