Haudenosaunee –also know as the Iroquois Confederacy


Comprised of the Mohawk, Cayuga, Seneca, Onondaga, Oneida and the Tuscarora

Mohawks live in several communities at Akwesasne, Kahnawake, Kanesatake, Tyendinega, and Wahta

Akwesasne is located between Ottawa and Montreal at Cornwall and is 6 hours north of New York City.


The Mohawks at Akwesasne are known as Akwesasronon

#### The Canada & United States Border

#### Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation of 1794 -Article III

It is agreed that it shall at all times be free to His Majesty's subjects and to the citizens of the United States, and also to the Indians dwelling on either side of the said boundry line, freely to pass and repass by land or inland navigation into the respective territories, and countries of the two parties, on the continent of North America (the country within the limits of the Hud-son's Bay Company only excepted), and to navigate all the lakes, rivers, and waters thereof, and freely to carry on trade and commerce with each other.

Borders create laws that adversely affect Akwesasronon:


