



Alberta Court of Justice Jurisdiction: Overview

- Criminal
 - Over 95% of Criminal Matters are concluded in the Alberta Court of Justice
- Family & Youth
 - Court of 1st instance for all Child Protection Matters
- Civil
 - Claims up to \$100,000
- Provincial Regulatory Offences
- Traffic Offences
- Fatality Inquiries
- Located in 72 Communities

Cawsey Report

"The Aboriginal people and all levels of Government have concerns about the level of justice provided by the current criminal justice system to Aboriginal people. Unless more balance can be created, justice will remain elusive, and discontent will continue. The impact of the criminal justice system on Aboriginal people can be measured by the disproportionate number of Aboriginals in our correctional institutions. Aboriginals are often at the receiving end of what appears to them to be a foreign system of justice delivered by a large extent by non-Aboriginals."

Statistical Review

- Alberta has the 3rd largest Indigenous population in the country following Ontario and British Columbia
- At last reporting, Alberta had the highest level of Indigenous incarceration, surpassing all other jurisdictions in Canada
- General lack of access Indigenous peoples have to the court system
- Pervasive lack of confidence that Indigenous peoples have with the court system
- Overrepresentation of Indigenous children in care

What is the Indigenous Justice Strategy (IJS)?

- commitment to work to provide a culturally relevant, restorative and holistic system of justice for Indigenous peoples that access the Court
- consists of 20 "responses" or concrete commitments on the part of the Court
- "Living Document"
- Evaluation and Accountability

2021-2024 Strategic Plan

Strategic Priority 5: Indigenous Initiatives:

The Court will work to provide a culturally relevant, restorative and holistic system of justice for Indigenous peoples that access the Court including accused persons, offenders, victims, families, youth and children as well as those Indigenous communities impacted by the actions of those who find themselves before the Court.

Priority 5.4:

Work collaboratively with Alberta Justice and Solicitor General to develop an Indigenous Justice Strategy







- Providing educational opportunities so as to ensure broad-based understanding of the history, heritage, and laws of local communities as well as an understanding of and, where appropriate, the participation in cultural activities
 - The Path
- Ensuring Bench Books on bail, sentencing and Indigenous child protection are prepared and up to date.
- Development of manual to assist Justice's and Justices of the Peace to explain legal processes and terminology in plain language





- Engaging in collaborative relationship building with the leadership of Indigenous communities and Indigenous service providers
 - Conducting meetings on at least an annual basis between the leadership of the Courts and the leadership of Treaty 6, 7 and 8 as well as with the leadership of the Métis Nation of Alberta and the Métis Settlements
- Creating resource for Justices containing land acknowledgments for Treaty 6, 7 and 8 as well as Alberta as a whole

- Addressing access to justice issues by working to understand the structures, systems and processes that impede access amongst Indigenous peoples
 - Includes geographical barriers, technological barriers, language barriers and resource barriers
- Observing the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation
- Encouraging Indigenous applications for employment in various capacities within the court system



- Establishment of Restorative Justice Programs
 - Wiyasow Iskweew Restorative Justice pilot project
- Development of Indigenous Courts
 - Calgary Indigenous Court
 - Edmonton Indigenous Court
 - Alexis Nation Sioux Nation
 - Siksika Nation
 - Tsuut'ina First Nation
- Incorporation of Indigenous principles and cultural practices into courts serving Indigenous Communities

Indigenous Judicial Shadowing Program

- An opportunity for lawyers, articling students and law students who identify
 as Indigenous to gain exposure and insights into the workings of the front lines
 of the judicial system through meeting with and shadowing Justices of the
 Court of Justice and Justices of the Peace.
- Pairs the participants with a Justice of the Court of Justice or Justice of the Peace for a 2–5-day period
