The Sparwood Project in Youth Justice

The Sparwood Project began about two and a half years ago in south eastern British Columbia and is expanding rapidly throughout various regions of Canada, particularly in British Columbia. Through the combined efforts of Sergeant Jake Bouwman, R.C.M.P., Sparwood, B.C., and defence counsel Glen Purdy, Barrister, a meaningful approach to youth justice, fashioned after the Australian and New Zealand models has been given life in Canada. Justice for youth, victims, communities and law enforcement services based upon restoration, rather than retribution has given a whole new look to the field of youth justice.
